Rising water during event	Paddlers, spectators, public	3	3	Organiser will: Inspect and continue to monitor how fast the water levels are rising. The starter and finisher should be able to notify of any sudden increase in water levels since as they are on the waters edge so would have to move in the event of sudden water level rises. Any anticipated water level changes will be communicated to all paddlers at the event briefing.
Being struck by moving vehicles in the car park / campsite	Paddlers, event volunteers, spectators, public	2	3	Parking is in a public layby off a single carriageway A-road. All attendees will be reminded at the briefing to be mindful when moving around the layby and especially when crossing the road with boats.
Slips, Trips, Falls	Paddlers, event volunteers, spectators	3	4	Event information to advise paddlers to beware of uneven surfaces. Access / egress from the river will be via public footpaths. The condition, and any extra measures required for access / egress from the river will be communicated at the event briefing. Ensure public footpaths are kept clear of boats at all times.

				First aid kits will be checked prior to the event and located at start and finish throughout the event.	
				First aid to be summoned via control - First Aid information to be included in event information and notices displayed at the event.	
				Emergency Plan covers summoning emergency services and/or directing people to local hospitals.	
Event notices / information – advising paddlers of hazards	All	1	2	Organiser to ensure that required / relevant safety notices are displayed at race control and if required by the river access and by finish.	
				Any notable hazards around access, egress or along the length of the course will be highlighted at the event briefing.	
Liability Insurance	All	1	5	Kayak Northumbria, on behalf of Wild Water Racing Committee, as part of a Paddle UK affiliated club hold a £10 million third party liability insurance.	
				All entrants must be members of a home nation association and this will be checked at the point of entry.	
Paddler not reaching the finish	Paddlers	1	3	All paddlers will have a start number allocated. Start and finish numbers will be compared. Paddlers will be briefed on ensuring they do not leave the race area without first reporting their withdrawal.	
				The start list will be ordered such that the last paddler down the course is competent and unlikely to capsize.

				Paddlers to be reminded of the requirement to stay on the water and provide safety after their runs until the next two boats are finished in event briefing.
				Race runs to be organised so there are adequate gaps between paddlers.
				Paddlers will be reminded at the briefing that it is a requirement to help any other paddler who is in distress during the race.
				Paddlers will be reminded at the briefing that it is their responsibility to decide they are competent to race

				All paddlers are notified that Canoeing is an 'assumed risk sport' both on completing entry and by notices displayed.
				Any specific pinning hazards will be highlighted at the event briefing.
Hypothermia	Paddlers	2	4	All paddlers to wear usual protective clothing / equipment for slalom paddling appropriate to the conditions / weather. To include Buoyancy Aid and helmet.
				First Aid kit to include suitable equipment to treat condition. Qualified First Aiders at the event.
Leptospirosis (Weil's Disease)	Paddlers	2	4	All paddlers to be aware of the risk and follow standard practice of covering cuts etc, and that Canoeing is an 'assumed risk sport' on event information and notices.
				As this is a natural river it is advised that all paddlers wash hands / face between paddling & eating.
				As per WWR rules, all paddlers must wear closed-toe footwear. This will reduce the likelihood of any small cuts to feet.
