Entrapment on rocks / stoppers/trees. Impact on major obstacles	Athletes and coaches on the water	The course will have been inspected in the few days before the event to check that the river does not contain any unexpected obstacles or obstructions. There are a number of rapids on the race course. The river banks have trees on them in various places. All athletes are advised to avoid all trees on the river bank and in the river. In the event of a swim, do not attempt to reach the river bank if there are trees in that area. Only approach the river bank in areas clear of trees. Grandtully rapid contains many large waves and rocks. Particular care is required to avoid the large rock in mid-stream in Grandtully rapid as there is a risk of pinning if hit broadside. The normal race route is to the right of this rock, but if there is any difficulty encountered in crossing the flow above the rock, competitors should be aware that the route to the left of the rock is possible and may be safer in this situation. There is a large stopper in the fall below the bridge which can be avoided if the competitor familiarises themselves with the route. All competitors should remain on the water until the next 2 paddlers have crossed the finish. When water levels are changing, dynamic risk assessment will alter the structure of sessions or competitions to control hazards.	December 2024
